EVERYTHING HAPPENING AT ST. JOHN'S THIS WEEK (AND MORE)



As the Administrative Assistant for the church, one of my main responsibilities is to prepare the weekly bulletin. With this new liturgical year, I decided to dig deeper into the scriptures as I place them in the bulletin, as well as the elements of special services such as the Exhortation. I have been reading the commentary in the Lector's Guide which gives additional insight to each of the readings, including the Psalms and Gospel readings. It's kind of been my own Bible study. When I come to the service, I am then able to sit and listen and absorb the readings. I have learned so much and find this has resulted in a richer experience of service.

I have to admit, though, that I found it difficult to understand the Exhortation. So, I asked Fr. Nate to give me a brief explanation. His reply was "an expanded form of self-reflection prior to the confession of sin." And that's what it really comes down to.

In my search for answers, I also found a number of words associated with "exhortation" - admonishment and encouragement, incite action, summon, beseech, and entreat. These words are helpful, but I also found historical context behind St Paul's exhortation to prepare carefully to receive the sacraments of the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus.

In the words of <u>Douglas A. Campbell</u>, "the church at Corinth was a mess." Campbell said their questions and concerns about the rules of marriage and divorce, women in church, and money echo the questions faced by many early believers then and those in every generation to follow. They faced doubt over whether Christ really rose from the dead.

"Word had reached [...] Paul that the Christian community in Corinth had fallen into a variety of serious moral errors," according to <u>Andy Rau</u>. First Corinthians, written to a "spiritually struggling Corinthian church was not intended just to harangue them for their failings. Paul challenged his Corinthian brothers and sisters [to] emulate[e] Jesus Christ." Admonishment and

encouragement.

So, there you have it. If you haven't fully understood and embraced the Exhortation, perhaps this will help. It helped me as well as giving me pause to read the passage carefully to find the full meaning St Paul's direction.

Here is your <u>Sunday bulletin</u>. We hope to see you on Sunday as we wait for the coming of our Savior!


