### EVERYTHING HAPPENING AT ST. JOHN'S THIS WEEK (AND MORE)



As many of you know I lived in Arizona for 35 years before returning to OKC in 2020 to live out my days in retirement, quietly surrounded by family and friends. Ha Ha Ha! There were many reasons that I was hesitant to return to Oklahoma and at the top of the list was HUMIDITY. I hate humidity. It makes me sleepy, cranky and I sure don't like feeling sticky all the time. I feel bloated and hungry, but don't want to eat cause it is just too hot to even eat. I still haven't adjusted back to these extreme waves of humidity. But isn't the city beautiful with all the bright green everywhere!

When I first moved to Arizona to the "but it's a dry heat" desert, I had many adjustments to make as I adapted to the dry air. It was almost a year in Arizona before I experienced my first monsoon season.

I had always thought that monsoons were a tropical weather event so that first year was a real surprise. However, the monsoon season in Arizona makes it feel tropical (humidity of 45% was considered THE WORST), a condition I wasn't expecting.

During the months of July through September, after a hot sunny day, dark clouds would roll in at 5:30ish, drop a bucket of rain, then clear out for the sun to return. The air is cooled and fresh for the evening only to repeat the process the next day. It was cool to watch the clouds over the mountains after the rain and there was most always a rainbow.

Monsoons account for a large portion of the annual precipitation in central and southern Arizona. They can also cause flash flooding, dust storms, and extreme heat. And when we had flash flooding, most of the water ran on down into the washes (see above photo with Tucson mountains in the background) and moments after a rain, the wash would be dry again. Then the frogs would begin to "sing."

If we had a "good" monsoon with rain almost daily, the desert would come alive with wildflowers and desert grasses. If we had a "bad" monsoon season, the coyotes, wildcats, and even bears would come down from the mountains in search of water. The effect of the monsoons are the deciding factor in the success of the agriculture of the state. I loved the monsoons.

So imagine how excited I have been to have Oklahoma monsoons. NOT! Strong winds, thunder and lightening and downpours in the middle of the night are not my idea of a fun monsoon. The storms freak Gracie out and keep me awake half the night.

Just about the time that I am ready to pack up and return to the desert, I look around me at all the new life we are experiencing. The grounds of St. John's are as green as an emerald and the flowers flourish. The golf courses are SO green that they don't look real. My yard is an oasis with knee-high grass (just kidding) and lots of flowers, bees, butterflies and birds. I thank God each morning as I rise to greet the new day and am thrilled by the color - and then I open the door.
