EVERYTHING HAPPENING AT ST. JOHN'S AND MORE THIS WEEK

Father Nate's message for April and Eastertide

John Donne, the great Anglican Divine and metaphysical poet, once wrote,

We thinke that Paradise and Calvarie, Christ's Crosse and Adams tree, stood in one place; Looke Lord, and find both Adams met in me; As the first Adams sweat surrounds my face, May the last Adams blood my soul embrace.

John Donne, in clear typological fashion, is drawing the most jarring parallel that Scripture could ever offer between the Old and New Testament. It is the jarring parallel of Holy Week. It is this: our father by nature is Adam. And in his first sin, we all fell. But the Gospel, as Donne understands it, is this: there was a second Adam whose name is Jesus, and those who are found in his righteousness are righteous. Those who failed with Adam at the first Tree of Life, may come to his Cross—the everlasting Tree of Life, and be washed in his blood. Those who were banished from the Garden of Eden, may be welcomed to the Garden of his Resurrection. Those who were conceived in sin, can now look to the One who was conceived of a Virgin Mother and a Virgin Tomb so that everlasting and eternal and abundant life might now flow to the chief of sinners. This life—the life between the two worlds---the life between old Adam and the second and last Adam—the life of both sinner and saint—is hallowed and sanctified and made meaningful and precious in the passion of Christ that we venerate during Holy Week.

In His Name . . .



This has been a quiet week at St. John's after all the preparation and celebrations of Holy Week. Gracie and I are resting in the peace that follows Easter, the first day of Eastertide.

Before I go further, please remember that I am still learning much about the Episcopal Church traditions and celebrations - things that I didn't learn in Arizona for all the years I was an Episcopalian there. So as I share information about customs and traditions, it is because I wonder if there are others who are unfamiliar with all the seasons of the liturgical year.

Simply put, Eastertide (also known as Paschaltide) is a festal season in the liturgical year of Christianity that focuses on celebrating the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. Each Sunday of the season is treated as a Sunday of Easter. Traditionally lasting 40 days to commemorate the time the resurrected Jesus remained on earth before his Ascension, in some western churches Eastertide lasts 50 days to conclude on the day of Pentecost or Whitsunday. The solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord is celebrated on the 40th day of Eastertide, always a Thursday. And there is a lot of history leading up to the current Easter traditions, feasts and celebrations. If you want to know more, google and Wikipedia are your friends.

Here at St. John's, after a few days of rest, the church is beginning to buzz again with activity. The altar guild is busy serving and preparing for the days of Eastertide. The choir is preparing beautiful music and we have some special feast days we will celebrate before Whitsunday on May 28. A calendar of Eastertide services is found below.

Around the church, activities continue to restore the church, clean out the old to make way for the new. Spring is all around us on this beautiful campus. I hope you will take a moment to savor the beautiful, peaceful grounds of St. John's.
