EVERYTHING HAPPENING AT ST. JOHN'S THIS WEEK (AND MORE)



Greetings Fellow Parishioners,

Earlier this week, I received an email from one of our parishioners telling me that Mother's Day was originally "mother church" day, when everyone went back to their original church on a Sunday in May. That was such a curiosity to me that I turned to the Internet to fact check and make sure this wasn't fake news!

Well, did I ever learn a lot. Mother's Day has a long history dating back to the ancient Greek and Romans who celebrated the mother goddesses — Rhea and Cybele. Since then, there is a rich history explaining how the holiday started and its Christian origins. (I don't know about you, but this surprised me.)

Before the Civil War, Ann Reeves Jarvis helped start the "Mother's Day Work Clubs" to teach local West Virginian women how to care for children. During the Civil War in the early 1860s, the club became a unifying force for many during a divided time. With the war in the nation's rear view in 1868, Jarvis organized "Mother's Friendship Day" where moms of both Union and Confederate soldiers gathered to promote reconciliation. Moms have always been good at mediating peace!

Following Ann Reeves Jarvis' death in 1905, her daughter championed efforts to establish a day celebrating mothers. She organized the first Mother's Day celebration in West Virginia in 1908. She spearheaded a campaign to take Mother's Day nationwide with a letter-writing

campaign to newspapers and politicians. That campaign culminated in President Woodrow Wilson declaring the second Sunday of May as Mother's Day in 1914. Fun Fact: other supporters of the effort included abolitionist and suffragette Julia Ward Howe, temperance activist Juliet Calhoun Blakely, Mary Towles Sasseen and Frank Hering. BUT that's not all there is to the story.

The biggest precedent for the maternal holiday can be traced back to "Mothering Sunday." Primarily celebrated in the United Kingdom and parts of Europe, Mothering Sunday is, to this day, the fourth Sunday of Lent. Because English churchgoers worship at the nearest parish to them, it was considered important for many that people return to their home or "mother" church once a year.

Thus, the return to church for many was a homecoming of sorts. It was a time for families to get together, reuniting with children for worship. "Mothering Sunday" (or "mother's church" day) was also a way for domestic servants or workers to get the day off to visit their mothers.

So, there you have it. Facts checked, story written and, I'm sure, conversation will ensue. Enjoy your Mother's Day - celebrate your mother(s) both living and those who've gone before. I sure miss my mom, even 23 years since her passing.
